



Couboy Charlie

Things to Remember:

- Use note cards or draw pictures on the boxes below to help you remember your story, but DO NOT write the whole story out in words.
- When you share your story with the class, remember to be expressive and make changes in your voice to make the story more exciting. If you say, "it got reeeeeeallly quiet" – then lower your voice as you say this. If you heard bells ringing, make the sound effect of bells, "ding dong" etc.
